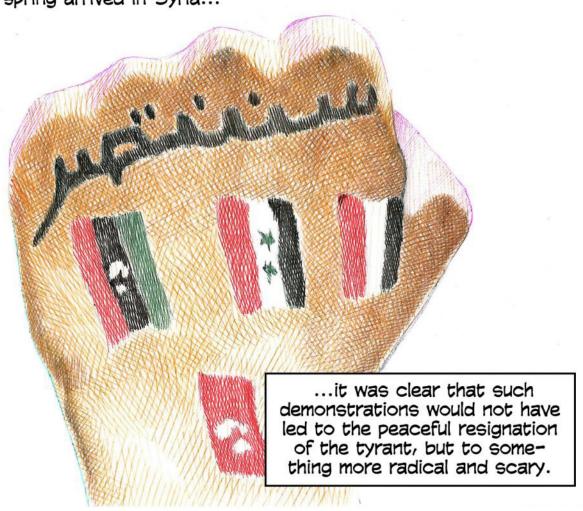
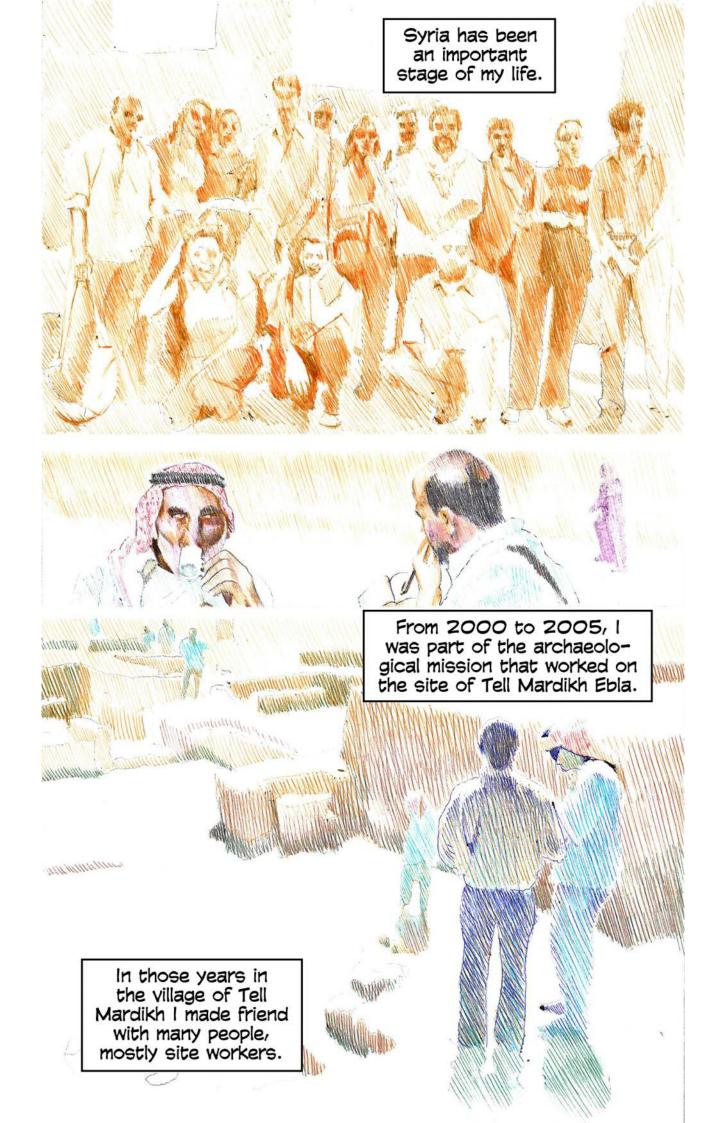
## THE HELL OVER EBLA

When in March 15, 2011 the great wave of the Arab spring arrived in Syria...



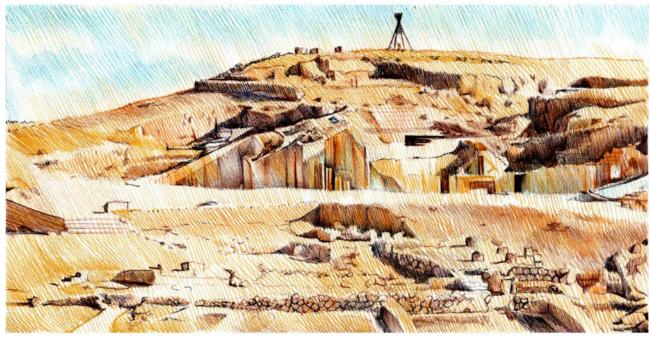




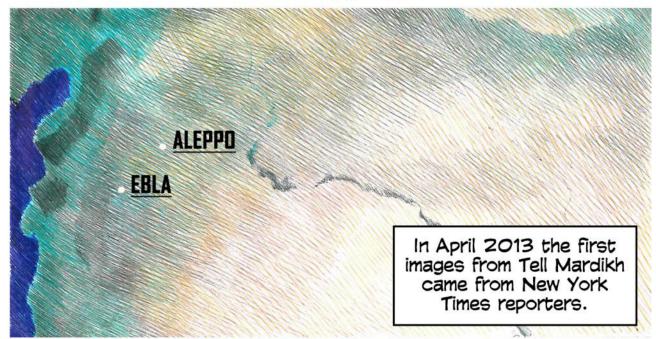
In 1975 the team of Italian archaeologists discovered five thousand cuneiform tablets.

The archives dated from the first phase of the urban centre, between 2500 and 2300 BC.

Since the outbreak of the civil war in Syria, the news about Ebla, arrived increasingly fragmented and third-hand.

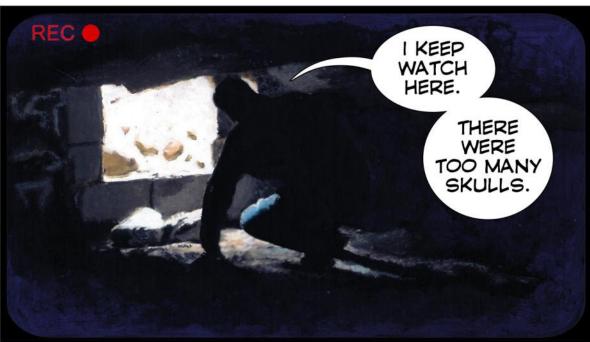














With a negative impact on the archaeological site.
